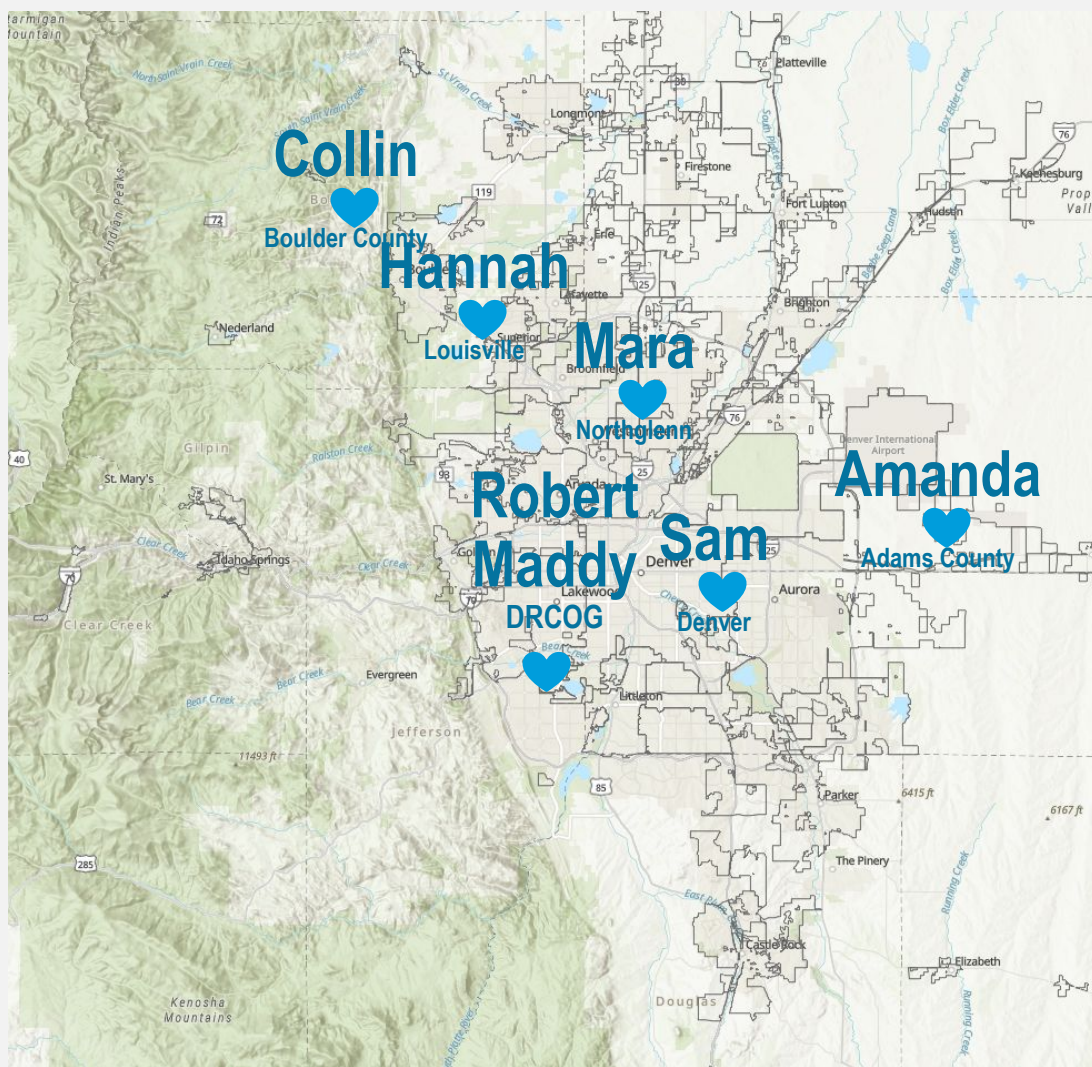

# Building Policy Collaborative (BPC) CPRG Grant Intent

- **Healthy, high-performance new construction and existing buildings through efficient construction and pollution-free equipment ensured by above-state-minimum building policy**
- **Lower energy cost burden for building occupants over lifetime of buildings and equipment**
- **Consistent and coordinated implementation of building policy to ease compliance and ensure residents and contractors are not left behind in the transition to clean building technology**
- **Collaborative solutions to common implementation challenges**
- **Transformative impacts from combination with other grant elements**

# Change is coming to Colorado!

## State code minimums

- Model Electric Ready and Solar Ready Code: adopt when adopting or updating any building code between **July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2026**.
- Model Low Energy and Carbon Code: This code minimizes overall carbon dioxide emissions associated with new and renovated homes and commercial buildings. Cities and counties with building codes must adopt these codes **when they update any other building codes after July 1, 2026**.
- Model Green Code - building attributes such as energy and water use efficiency, electrification, low carbon building materials, etc

## Colorado Energy Office Collaboration

- Tech assist and resources for code adoption
- Common data library
  - Costs and benefits
  - Grid Capacity
  - Local data gaps

# Building Policy Collaborative (BPC) Grant Milestones

End of 2024	Workshops have identified priority implementation needs
End of 2025	Jurisdictions have co-developed a region-wide roadmap towards zero emission buildings; individual jurisdictions have identified their policy priorities through 2030; first round of jurisdiction support funds awarded (continued periodically).
End of 2026	Participating jurisdictions are implementing state Low Energy and Carbon Code.
End of 2027	Communities representing 65% of regional population are implementing zero-emission building policy for new construction.
2030 Goal	Entire region operates under zero- or near-zero emission building policy for new construction; communities representing 65% of regional population implementing enhanced appliance requirements; communities representing 33% of regional population have advanced energy efficiency requirements for buildings 10,000 to 50,000 sq ft.
2050 Goal	Nearly 100% of region's buildings are operating at zero emissions.

# Policy collaborative and jurisdictional support.

- **\$34.8 million in subawards to DRCOG's member governments.**
  - Direct staff capacity (internal or contracted).
  - Other process and system support.
  - *Workgroup developing eligible measures list based on needs.*
- **\$2.6 million contract for regional policy network facilitation.**
  - Coordination, stakeholder engagement, attending community councils, preparing materials, maintaining databases, and composing proposals.
  - *Workgroup developing facilitation goals and roles.*
- **\$1 million budget for localized research.**
  - Data gathering and analysis to support collaborative needs.
  - *Workgroup identifying information gaps in local cost, infrastructure, and implementation data.*

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# Summary from Today

## Priority Outcomes

- Big Picture: Electrification and Efficiency (& enforcement) / Electric (cold climate) new and existing construction and equipment
- Political will to advance codes
- One portal for customers
- High code consistency and compliance
- Consistency in other city processes: permitting, licensure
- Education (home/building owners, city leadership)
- Locally Relevant Research

## Priority Barriers

- Costs, allocation, and and perception (developers say they'll move elsewhere)
- Lack of knowledge and education (and mis/disinformation) across public
- Contractors and builders not on board
- Effective communication to LIDAC populations
- Communication tools/data for residents and decisionmakers (incl. grid capacity)
- Do our local decisionmakers understand building decarb, and is it a campaign-winning issue?
- Where does leadership come from?

## Priority Actions / Opportunities

- Early engagement w/comms/messaging/marketing
- Vetted contractor list
- Connect with sustainability, comprehensive plans
- Decisionmaker convening (DRCOG) for pol will
- Consistent and inclusive Communications
- Legal review/guidance to prevent challenges
- Clear marketing for cost/benefits
- Ease of admin, if there is a portal etc.. not a burden
- Locally relevant research
- Know that neighbors are moving too
- Identify and activate industry allies

## Priority Support Needs

- Fund capacity-staff+consultants for local jurisdictions
- Show alignment with jurisdictions thru BPC
- Enforcement Capacity (staff & resources for why)
- LIDAC engagement capacity (staff & resources)
- Early connection BPC to Messaging to get materials for decisionmakers and residents/builders
- Create best practices, for customers and policy
- Consistent policy and blueprints, training
- Industry/builder buy-in
- Unifying local licensing and permitting
